intersection of time and eternity. By reconstructing a highly sophisticated but almost forgotten world-view, Mercurius restores to us our own spiritual heritage which, rooted in the alchemists' dark retorts, will perhaps flower in the light of the future.

Astronomy was a core pursuit for observatories, but usually not the only one. It belonged to a larger group of

“observatory sciences” that also included geodesy, meteorology, geomagnetism, and even parts of physics and statistics.
